Many of us have reached 70 years, the Biblical



NATIONAL 9 RAR 50th ANNIVERSARY REUNION, ADELAIDE


Details for the reunion can be found on the web at www.9rarsa.com.au. The programme commences with Company gatherings at various venues in and around Adelaide and are an optional PAYG (pay as you go) activity. The "formal" reunion dinner, held on the date of the formation of the Battalion 13th November, commences with pre-dinner drinks (aka Meet & Greet) from 6:00 pm in the Hilton Hotel The next day sees a Service of Adelaide. Remembrance to our war dead held at Keswick Barracks, the birth place of the Battalion. The reunion concludes with a picnic (because it's more than a BBQ) at Lake Breeze Winery, Langhorne Creek.

The aim of the organising committee is to keep the cost to attend the reunion at a minimum to encourage as many members of the battalion to attend as is possible given our age and health. Fund raising, grant applications and sponsorship will help. At this stage members attending the dinner are being asked to pay a deposit of \$50. If our fund-raising is successful this will be the final cost. Like the Company gatherings, the picnic is a PAYG activity so how much one pays for their food and drinks is up to the individual.

Already 467 people have paid to attend the dinner with a further 101 having said they are coming and 51 who have said they may be coming, the total number potentially attending the dinner is 619.

Expecting 350 and allowing for 500 maximum these numbers far exceed expectations and will cause some logistic problems we have to deal with. Members are encourage to book and pay early to be assured of one of the 550 seats in the main ballroom and not be in the balcony room.

John Schumann has confirmed his availability to play on the night as well as to join us for dinner (as a paying inducted member).

Master of Ceremonies Russell Campbell OAM outlined the service before the catafalque party members took their places around the cross.

The welcome address was given by RARA SA President Michael von Berg MC, OAM; the Call to Worship and prayers were given by Chaplain David Prior, 7RAR; the Commemorative Address by Rodney Harris, 4 RAR Association President; the Roll of Honour was read by David Stacey, 9 RAR Association President; the scripture reading from Ecclesiasticus 44 was presented by Deane Pye, Australian SAS Association SA Branch Secretary; The Ode recited by John Genovese, RFD 1 RAR SA; and the Last Post and The Rouse played by Bugler Michael Bampton, 10/27 RSAR.

Ed Cowley W Company 4 RAR /NZ (ANZAC) lead the Hat Dich veterans laying of tributes and Hat Dich veteran Craig Haydock, President RAAC Vietnam Veterans Association SA also laid a tribute.

Adding more emotion to the occasion, Catherine Lambert and the Terrace Singers sang the "Royal Australian Regiment Prayer of Consecration" and "Amazing Grace". They have been staunch supporters of RARA SA Association commemorations for many years. Catherine arranged for the prayer to be set to music.

During the laying of tributes Pipe Major Des Ross played a lament and later the farewell march as Waltzing Matilda.

Lunch was served after the service with many attendees taking the opportunity to catch up with friends they had not seen for some time.

Thanks must go to the Minister of Veterans Affairs SA for his grant and 4 RAR SA and 9 RAR SA for their donations which combined almost covered the costs of the service and lunch.

Comemorative address by Rodney Harris, President 4 RAR Association SA 4719545 Pte Reginald Arthur Phillips

In the 1940s Murray Bridge was a vibrant town which serviced the surrounding farming community with great dedication.

It was only two years after the end of WW2 that Reginald Arthur Phillips was born on 17th April 1947 to Sydney and Lorna Phillips. Within a few years Reg was joined by two younger sisters, Janet and Helen.



Reg was educated at Murray Bridge Infant School, Murray Bridge Primary

School and Murray Bridge High School, and later attended the Murray Bridge Technical College where he learned and excelled at welding.

He gained employment with Nicolai and Fisk Machinery Ltd in Murray Bridge which specialised in Massey Ferguson Tractors and other farm machinery, which suited Reg right down to the ground.

Reg became very popular with the surrounding farming community because of his ability to repair their machinery. He built his own dune buggy and that, with Glenda, his fiancée, and his keenness for fishing, were the three loves of his life.

His life changed when he was called up for National Service in 1967.

Reg did his Recruit Training at Puckapunyal in Victoria, Corps Training at Singleton in New South Wales, and was finally posted to 9 Battalion, the Royal Australian Regiment in April of 1968. On 20th November of that year Reg arrived in South Vietnam with 9 RAR. He remained with his Section during their operational training, and then deployed on Operation KING HIT from mid December to Christmas Eve 1968.

On New Year's Day 1969 9 RAR deployed to the Hat Dich region in the southern part of the Bien Hoa Province to counter the enemy build-up for the Tet Offensive.

During the afternoon of January 18 1969 "Reg's platoon" came into contact with a group of enemy and in the following fire fight Reg was severely wounded. Despite the supreme efforts of the Army surgeon, Reg died later that evening in the 1st Australian Field Hospital at Vung Tau.

Reg's Section 2IC Pte Geoff "Tubby" Shaw was wounded in the same contact while evacuating Reg, and another section member, Pte John Brewer, was also wounded.

I have spoken to Reg's loving family and, understandably, they still grieve for the boy who never came home.

Reg will never be forgotten by the community of Murray Bridge, as the RSL Function Room is now named after Reg and another Murray Bridge soldier who died in Vietnam, Pte Jeffry Rivett.

The room is proudly named the Phillips - Rivett Hall




FISHY TALES Contributed by Michael Mummery

Soldier dies in accident

A national serviceman, was killed accidentally during operations against enemy forces in the Bien Hoa province of South Vietnam on Wedgesday.

He was Private Grantley, James Scales, 22, single, of Glandore, South Australia, a member of the 9th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment.

In six separate contacts with a local Vietcong unit in Phuoc Tuy province on Tuesday night, the 5th Battalion killed 12 enemy soldiers in an area four miles from the Australian Task Force Base at Nui Dat.

2 die in ambush in Phuoc Tuy

Two Australian soldiers were killed and another was wounded in action against the enemy in a bunker system in Phuee Tuy Province, South Vietnam, on Saturday.

Those killed were:

- Corporal Bruno Adam Josef Adamczyk, 22, married, of Smithfield Plains, South Australia. Private Beresford Paul
- Edwards, 23, married, of St Marys, NSW.
- Sergeant Desmond Stanley Cochrane, national serviceman, 24, single, of Virginia, Brisbane, received fragmentation wounds and was evacuated to the 1st Australian Field Hospital at Vung Tau, where he is reported to be in a very satisfactory condition.
- All the men were from the 9th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment.

NUI DAT, South Vietnam, Sunday (AAP Special). — Two Australians were killed and one was wounded in a Vietcong ambush 15 miles north west of here yesterday.


The Vietcong, estimated to be about 10 strong, fired on a platoon from the 9th Battalion. RAR, with rocket - propelled grenades and rifles. The Australians called in artillery and helicopter gunships but the Vietcong withdrew, apparently without loss. NUI DAT, Sunday (AAP). — Vietcong in tunnels under a cornfield in the village of Dat Do, tossed a grenade today at a group of Australians searching the field and caused light casualties.

The Australians had just ripped away the covered entrance of a tunnel when about five Vietcong burst out of several other tunnels hidden in the corn. One of them lobbed a grenade at the Australians.

A Vietnamese Government soldier with the Australians was wounded and one Vietcong was killed. Two rifles were found in the tunnels along with a quantity of documents.

THE AUSTRALIAN WAR MEMORIAL

- THE FLANDERS MEMORIAL GARDEN

The Flanders Memorial Garden, was opened to the public on Tuesday 4 April.

This garden contains sacred soil taken from the battlefields of Flanders, Belgium, in which lie the remains of more than 13,000 Australians. Half have no known grave. It rests here with soil collected by the RSL from significant military heritage sites in each Australian state and territory. The site also served as a centre for military recruitment.

The garden features plantings of seasonal blooms of poppies, cornflower and daffodils,

being traditional floral symbols of commemoration in Europe. A centenary gift from the people of Flanders, this memorial garden commemorates all of those Australians who lost their lives fighting in Flanders in the First World War.

- LAST POST CEREMONY AND CALENDAR

(AWM/What's on/Last Post Ceremony/The calendar)

The Last Post Ceremony commences at 1655 AEST and is broadcast live daily via webcam on the Memorial's website, also on the AWM Facebook page. The calendar is worth checking if planning a visit to the AWM.

- ROLL OF HONOUR NAME PROJECTION

During the Centenary period, the name of each of the 62,000 Australians who gave their lives during the First World War will be projected onto the façade of the Hall of Memory at the Australian War Memorial. The names will be displayed from sunset to sunrise every night, and can be seen from the Memorial's grounds. Each name will be visible for 30 seconds.

This special commemoration runs from 4 August 2014 until 11 November 2018. During this period, the entire set of 62,000 names will be displayed about 30 times.

Search the Roll of Honour to help you find out when a particular person's name will be projected. This site provides the estimated date and time at which the name will be displayed. The information will be updated during the Centenary period.
