#### WHO REMEMBERS FREEMANTLE DECEMBER 1969



Wives, sweethears, friends and relatives were momentarily forgotten by homecoming soldiers as cans of beer were thrown up over the side of the troopship HMAS SYDNEY at Freemantle today.

Returning from Vietnam to Australia in the ship were 494 soldiers of the Ninth Battalion , in which Bill Whitney was recently discharged from thought of the idea.

Bill and his brother soon ran out of supplies they left and returned with an army trunk full of bottles and cans . The soldiers dropped down a line to which Bill tied bottles of beer which were hauled aboard.

The soldiers were eventually let off the ship onto the wharf. Here the renown left wing "Wharfies" shared French Congac which they had liberated from some shipment. Soldiers were drinking Congac out of china cups.

It made sleeping in the hammocks that night as they sailed off much easier.

Bill Whitney was a seasoned regular who toured with 2 RAR/NZ in 1967/68 and then returned in December 1968 and served with 4RAR/NZ, 2nd D&E Plt and then 12 plt D coy 9 RAR

#### BOOK REVIEW By Cpl Barry Wakefield retired .

All Day Long the Noise of Battle - An Australian attack in Vietnam by Gerard Windsor

Each battalion has its own set of 'dramas'. For C Coy 7RAR, Monday February 5th 1968 at around 1515 was the start of an extraordinary set of circumstances. The TET offensive had started just a few days before & C Coy found themselves in Bien Hoa province attacking a bunker system on & off for 3 days. Most people have heard about Long Tan, Coral & Balmoral but the story of this attack was something I had never heard about. Perhaps the set of circumstances that arose to bury this event in the mists of time was just a coincidence or maybe it was something else. Either way, after reading this book I felt as if everyone should have known about it.

Rather unfortunately the action was never dignified with the name of a battle: the nearest village being 6kms away, reports that should have been filed, weren't, and soldiers who should have been recommended for bravery awards were not. The writer felt through his investigation that one particular officer should have been recommended for a Victoria Cross. In the weird world of awards where quotas were king sadly people who deserved to be recognised weren't.

The writer reports details not as facts but as information gathered from all different sources. I found the book easy reading & highly informative. It also gives the reader an insight to the characters that every company has.

The Americans believed that the NVA/VC would attack their supply & air bases at Bien Hoa & Long Binh & asked the Australians for assistance, which is why 7RAR was moved the 40kms north to Operation Coburg. With C Coy finding & attacking a large bunker system for 3 days.

It was only a few weeks later that 7 RAR came home, due to arrive in Sydney aboard the HMAS Sydney on Anzac Day 1968. It was delayed so there was no conflict with the parade. They were marched through the streets the following day minus most of its national servicemen.

For me, the most poignant part of the story was of a digger trying to get a bottle of milk late at night after getting off the plane but being unable to do so as he 'didn't have an empty' to swap! His pleas went unheeded. He was picked up for home by his family, got to his room sat down on his bed & began to bawl his eyes out. His mother came in & said 'That's enough of that, you're home now'. That says a lot about the lack of understanding of the families & society at large.

G'day Rick

Thank you very much for enquiring about the 9th Battalion AIF marker pennant on display at the Anzac Memorial, Hyde Park.

The mythical history of the marker pennant is much more fascinating than reality I'm afraid. It was souvenired by a sergeant named Coyle from the 9th Battalion AIF. Coyle's service record indicates that he did not land on Gallipoli as he contracted a disease and was repatriated in 1915.

The pennant first entered the public domain in 1927 when it was used in an Anzac Day March and touted as 'the first flag ashore at Anzac.' This is a wonderful story, and deserves to be true, but like so many of our Anzac legends there is a strong sense of myth surrounding it and there is much that we will never know.

It is a misnomer to call this object a flag. It is a marker pennant. The pennant is rather crudely made and appears to be an unofficial attempt to create a formation sign for the 9th Battalion of the 3rd Brigade of the 1st Division of the Australian Imperial Force at the time that the AIF was adopting a system of colour patches. The AIF adopted a system of colour patches in the weeks before the Anzac landing. Colour patches replaced the barely visible oxidised brass numerals and corps abbreviations that the men of the AIF had worn as unit badges from their formation in September 1914.

The 3rd Brigade had light blue or 'Saxe' blue as its brigade colour, the bottom colour on a horizontally divided rectangular colour patch. The top colour indicates the battalion. The 9th Battalion, as the first battalion of the 3rd Brigade uses the colour black. The second battalion of the brigade uses purple as the top colour, the third Battalion, Brown, the fourth Battalion white. This created a system whereby the informed observer could work out which battalion in which brigade a soldier belong to by looking at his colour patch.

As I have mentioned, this system was introduced when the AIF was already serving overseas so I believe the marker pennant was a locally produced object that was used to indicate tent lines or battalion headquarters while the 1st Division was in camp in Egypt or on Lemnos.

As to whether it actually went ashore at Gallipoli, I have my doubts. As a veteran of a 20th-century war yourself you will appreciate that the idea of carrying a flag onto a battlefield when the enemy has high-powered repeating rifles with good-quality sights is folly.

Our marker pennant does have some rather famous signatures including two princes and at least one general. I will have a colleague send you the information on the signatures shortly.

The Battalion was formed on 13 November 1967 in South Australia. The Battalion served in South Vietnam from 5 November 1968 to 25 November 1969. The Battalion then remained at Enoggera until the 31 October, 1973 when it merged with 8 RAR to become the 8th/9th Battalion, The Royal Australian Regiment (8/9 RAR). The Battalion's service in South Vietnam resulted in the award of a Distinguished Service Order, two Military Crosses, seven Military Medals, and eleven members of the Battalion were Mentioned in Dispatches.

#### **The Bushranger Story**

This story describes the development and introduction to operational service of the Royal Australian Air Force 'Bushranger' Iroquois helicopter gunship during the Vietnam War, a derivative of the Bell UH-1H that was unique in the world.

The first hand account of this project by Wing Commander Brian Dirou, DFC (Ret'd) provides an accurate record of a highly successful and enterprising endeavour accomplished within No. 9 Squadron to provide a very effective intimate close air support weapons capability that reflected typical Australian ingenuity.

The story graphically depicts several action events to demonstrate the need for the gunship capability and the effectiveness of the Bushranger concept, also the operational discipline and intimate teamwork necessary in very close quarters engagements with the enemy. Australian and New Zealand Air Force, Navy and Army personnel involved in these actions are also mentioned.

Humourous and sad anecdotes balance the story and some moving poetic tributes are also included. The tale reflects appreciable credit upon the Air Force.
