












TRAVELLING IN STYLE



THE PREDIENT'S REPORT

A number of 9RAR members attended the RAR Service in Regimental Square prior to the march on Anzac Day. It is always an exceptional experience and one of the rare opportunities for members of the regiment to mingle irrespective of what battalion each served in. General Mick Slater CO Forces Command gave an informative, concise and stimulating address outlining the deeds of each Battalion over the past year and the roles each will play in the years to come. He is a very impressive leader who spoke with clarity, vision, humility and praise for all who have served the regiment. He described members of the regiment as "ordinary people doing extraordinary deeds" who bear the responsibility of being "Custodians of the Anzac spirit." It was a very thought provoking and invigorating address.

We then moved off to form up and march in our individual units.

The Sydney Reunion has been widely reported with all well earned praise being accepted by those who worked so tirelessly under Chairman Trevor Murdoch. This was the first time we have been together since those remarkable events of November last year but the reunion camaraderie was in evidence as we formed up. The new Afghanistan Memorial was dedicated last week recognising the commitment of all who have served in this conflict and in particular the sacrifice of the 40 Australian warriors who have lost their lives

QUEST FOR A MATE

The following is an excerpt from a number of emails (edited and amalgamated by A/Editor) received early this year. It is from a concerned 'Stuart' Hodgson, regarding his mate Merv Judd.

Ηi,

My name is Stuart Hodgson. I served in Vietnam with 4th Platoon, B Company December 1968-February 1969.

I was injured and returned to Australia along with my mate Mervyn Judd who also served in Vietnam, 4th Platoon, B Company.

I was advised a couple of years ago, whilst trying to contact Mervyn in Tamworth NSW, that Mervyn had died some years prior (approx 6 years). A Vietnam Veteran Association member was able to contact DVA who confirmed this for me. Apparently his family have never even claimed his remains and he has not been laid to rest. He did have a wife and children (we caught up in 1981) but obviously that went sour. Nobody in Tamworth remembered him, not even the RSL or surrounding clubs. We were hoping that you may have a contact who can give us more information.

I am now very ill and would like to ensure that Mervyn is mentioned in the Honour Roll as his family have not seen fit to ensure this has happened. I did ask a 9 RAR member here in Adelaide some time ago but note that it still has not happened.

Could you please ensure that Merv gets the recognition he deserves. In anticipation of your co operation and assistance, I am very thankful.

Since this series of email South Australian members (Adrian Craig and others) have visited Stuart in hospital, He is home now but remains very ill. He graphically portrays the problem of being a REO, only in 4 Platoon for a couple of weeks. He can't remember other Platoon members apart from Merv Judd, who was shot in the same contact and is now dead. If one of you out there would give him a ring I'm sure he'd appreciate it. 
JACK SELMES

BUTLER MEDAL

The Butler Medal or medalette struck in sterling silver and enamel with the colour patch of the 9th Bn on the obverse, was presented by Capt Butler's family to all members of the 9 Bn who served continuously on the Gallipoli Peninsula for the six months between the 25 April and 25 October 1915.

Hallmarked sterling silver, the reverse is chisel engraved in three lines for ORs – with regimental number on the top line, and two lines for officers with the top line for rank and the lower for initials and sumame as shown.



A total of 94 were presented including six Lieutenants, two CSMs, five Sergeants, 5 Corporals, 7 Lance Corporatione Bugler with the remaining 68 to Privates. A complete list is available in *Campaigning with the Fighting 9th* b C.M. Wrench MC p433.



INTO THE HELL OF HAT DICH January 1969

9RAR is Raised and Rapidly sent to War

The raising of 9RAR on 13 November 1967 at Keswick Barracks in Adelaide was unique in two ways: firstly it wasn't based on the usual practice of drawing on a cadre of trained officers and men from an established battalion but instead was constituted by the posting of individual Officers and NCOs and by drafts directly from Recruit Training Battalions; secondly the Battalion had to be raised, trained and tested within a single year before deploying to Vietnam. In line with the often practice of muddled thinking, the planners at AHQ in Canberra in acknowledging that the Vietnam War was set in a tropical environment, then proceeded to have 9RAR train in one of the most arid and in winter, coldest areas of Australia, to wit the Cultana Training Area and the north Flinders Ranges. Training however, did occur at JTC Canungra and a test exercise at Shoalwater Bay and after a farewell march through Adelaide in early October, the Battalion (Lt Col AL Morrison, CO; WO1 D Cassidy, RSM) departed Port Adelaide on HMAS Sydney on 9 November 1968.

After a couple of work-up operations involving: a Cordon and Search of An Nhut Village (King Hit One); and a short Reconnaissance In Force operation about 20 kilometres north of Nui Dat (King Hit Two), the Battalion replaced 1RAR on Operation Goodwood.

9RAR Operation Goodwood: 1-29 January1969

The operation began with A Company (Maj WL Smith) joining HQ 1RAR at FSB Diggers Rest to supervise the fly-in of the remainder of the Battalion less B Company (Maj EA Chitham) which deployed by APC along Route 15. As usual the area of operations was divided into company AOs and patrolling commenced in the southern parts immediately.

As the companies moved north contact with the enemy increased, mainly with small groups and the pattern of operations varied with company movement dictated by enemy reactions. In one case for example, C Company (Maj LJ Lewis) was airlifted from the north east of the AO to the south west in response to a sighting of a large enemy group by aerial reconnaissance.

On 1 and 2 January 10 Platoon (Lt PI McAuley) had successful contacts with small enemy groups (1) and on 5 January the Platoon was engaged from a large enemy bunker system with RPGs and small arms (2). The Forward Scout (Pte DJ Cromb) continued to engage the enemy with rifle fire and M79 grenades allowing six wounded men, including

the 10 Platoon Sergeant (Sgt GV Rashleigh) to be evacuated and then to cover the deployment of 11 Platoon to a flank which distracted the enemy thus allowing 10 Platoon to withdraw.

On the same day, 4 Platoon (2Lt MJ Bell) contacted five enemy (3) killing two but losing its Platoon Sergeant (Sgt JM Duroux) who died from wounds. On 6 January, 5 Platoon (Lt IM Clark) was investigating a track running from an enemy water point (4) when it was engaged with a claymore mine killing one man (Pte G Nagle) and wounding five including a Section Commander (Cpl AW Graham).who died from his wounds the next day.

Article from "A DUTY DONE". A summary of operations by the Royal Australian Regiment 1965-1972. By Lt Col (ret) Fred Fairhead.



Anatomy of a Bunker System The sketch is adapted from one prepared by Cpl JH McKay of a bunker system located by C Company 9RAR in January 1969. The two man bunkers, sited in depth and all round defence were mainly for protection against aerial bombardment with fighting done from behind or alongside the bunker. This allowed the extensive use of RPGs with back blast areas provided and fire lanes cleared on all approaches.

Each cluster of bunkers could be mutually supported by fire and reinforced through crawl trenches.

They were a formidable obstacle to overcome.

BOOK REVIEW

The Defence of the Realm-The Authorizes History of MI5

by Christopher Andrew

In 2009 MI5 celebrated it's centenary & to mark the occasion a very thick tome was published giving the reader an inside look into the world of security, spying, counter intelligence & the like. It makes for a fascinating subject.


The author is Christopher Andrew, who has really done a marvelous job in wading through what must have been more files than you could read in your lifetime. Christopher was given free reign to wade through all archives unless they were active. His background is one of education being a professor of Modern & Contemporary History & former chair of the Faculty of History at Cambridge Uni. He is also the chair of the British Intelligence Study Group. He somehow found time to write 15 books & be a visiting professor at Harvard.

The amount of detail available to the reader is astonishing, but highly entertaining. The service first came to prominence in WW1 where they seemed to have the Kaiser's measure. Even in WW2 they were able to fool Hitler by 'running' the German security services via subdefuge & false information. It is a disadvantage of security work that the results are negative. That is to say the better it is carried out the less there is to show for it.

One comical point to me was P.M. Ramsey MacDonald had a distrust of security, he always kept it at arms length. He never knowingly met with MI5 or any of the security services. When he finally had to question a Major Malcolm Woolcombe head of S.I.S. he had him placed in an adjoining room. He then had an aide placed in the doorway to relay Q & A's. These bizarre proceedings continued & at no time did Major Woolcombe catch sight of the P.M.!

So complete was the disguise of where the British troops were through disinformation that even after D Day the Germans were convinced the main attack would come through Calais.

Another successful measure was to be able to fool the Germans as to the point of impact of the V1's & V2's. They in turn adjusted their aim which resulted in considerably less casualties. Later it was concluded that 1300 less had been killed & 10,000 less injured.

Post WW2 the USSR were very aware of the things in the west, they had spies in most countries, however western intelligence had noone inside their services. In fact 3 days after the Atomic bomb was dropped on Hiroshima the G.R.U. had details of the dropped bomb & 2 sample of Uranium. An enriched specimen & a thin deposit. This knowledge was gained from a defector who revealed a major ring in Canada & came close to unmasking Kim Philby. A month after Hiroshima, Soviet Intelligence had obtained documentary materials of the atomic bomb, technological process, drawings & calculations.

Gradually the west was able to meet the threat from the USSR, this was helped by a consolidation of the service. In the 80's the security services found themselves in 9 different buildings & apart from a main frame computer little had changed. However by the ingenious use of a single track railway, files were able to be moved around.Prior to this a fleet of vans were driving from building to building, many carrying classified documents. Many of these were urgently required & could be stuck in traffic jams.

The most effective way to counter the USSR's spying was to deny visas to some operatives & expel others. In total 105 were expelled which put them on the back foot.Until then there were so many intelligence officers that British security was swamped. A defector was able to point out those who were intelligence officers & they were expelled. An interesting point was that he also showed them a map with landing sites in north Yorkshire for soviet forces & paratroopers. This was stopped due to the expulsions.

The book continues through all the troubled period of the I.R.A. & onto the modern threats, basically it's never over, as Winston Churchill said "The further backwards you look, the further forward you can see"

A must read for anyone who enjoys the truth about what has happened in our lifetime.

The Battalion was formed on 13 November 1967 in South Australia. The Battalion served in South Vietnam from 5 November 1968 to 25 November 1969. The Battalion then remained at Enoggera until the 31 October, 1973 when it merged with 8 RAR to become the 8th/9th Battalion, The Royal Australian Regiment (8/9 RAR). The Battalion's service in South Vietnam resulted in the award of a Distinguished Service Order, two Military Crosses, seven Military Medals, and eleven members of the Battalion were Mentioned in Dispatches.

With the end of Vietnam War lists the OC A Coy Major W. McDonald had his MID (mentioned in Dispatches) upgraded to a Medal of Gallantry and 2nd Lt Geoffrey Locke was awarded an Commendation for Distinguished Service



A Company



On 18 and 19 January, A and B Companies had a series of contacts with tragic outcomes. On 18 January 2 Platoon (*2Lt AJ Daniels*) was the point platoon moving into a company harbour when it was engaged by a VC squad (7) fatally wounding the Forward Scout (*Pte RA Phillips*) who was retrieved by the Company Medic (*Cpl APP Rae*). Early the next morning as the Platoon was retrieving Claymore Mines, an enemy group fired three RPG rounds into the Company position one of which landed in 2 Platoon's area; three men were killed including the Platoon Sergeant (*Sgt JR Cock*) and (*Pte RM Key and Pte A Sykes*) and five wounded including a Section Commander and a Section 2ic.
