### Schoey Versus The Water Buffalo – (Circa 1969)

**Introduction.** Schoey, aka Colin Schofield and father of the very talented Justine Schofield (host of Everyday Gourmet) was a 'Nasho' serving in 6 Platoon, B Company during 9 RAR's tour in Vietnam. During the tour, Schoey and I shared an 'incident' involving a very agitated and irate water buffalo. About 20+ years ago at a 9 RAR reunion, Schoey asked me to document this because he wasn't convinced that his family and friends believed him when he 'waxed lyrical' about the time he wrestled a water buffalo to the ground and walked away unscathed. I promised him I would do that and now offer an apology for being 20 + years late!

**The Tale.** I was in charge of one of those dreaded TAOR patrols, which was tasked to lay an overnight ambush at a location west of the village of Hoa Long. The patrol was made up of diggers from all B Company platoons and CHQ (Brian "Dog" Mooney, John "Watto" Watson, 'Jock' Russell, "Brylcream" Bennett, 'Bluey' Reed and Peter Wynd spring to mind). Schoey was appointed Patrol 2IC.

As we patrolled beyond the Paddy Fields, we encountered villagers from Hoa Long hurrying back towards the village to avoid breaking curfew. We propped and I commenced sending in a Locstat on the radio when a water buffalo burst out of the scrub in the immediate vicinity. He was heading in my direction when the radio handset was flung one direction and I dived in the opposite direction trying to find some cover that may offer protection from the crazed beast

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After I hit the ground, I looked up to see bodies diving into the ditch either side of our narrow axis of advance as the buffalo, head down and charging, continued searching for a victim. Alas, Schoey was 'tail-end-charlie' and the huge beast hit him front-on (no doubt Schoey was searching his arcs at the

ers) appeared. They were clearly unhappy and showed signs of hostility. Let me emphasise that they were not the only ones who were unhappy/ hostile!



To keep a long story at a manageable length, the patrol continued and the following day back at Nui Dat during the patrol debrief, I was verbally reprimanded for being flippant (after the incident, I transmitted a Contact After Action Report with the outcome being 1 x Water Buffalo KIA and Sunray Minor shaken but uninjured). I was informed some days later that compensation had been paid for the loss of the water buffalo!

I always thought that Schoey was a cool dude, but after that incident he was elevated to a super cool dude!

#### **BOOK REVIEW: THROUGH ENEMY EYES:**

#### Author Dave Sabben . Reviewer Ross Richard

Sometimes you read a book that has a pretty profound effect on you.

I've just done that.

I've just read Through Enemy Eyes by Dave Sabben.

First, let me tell you about Dave Sabben.

Second Lieutenant Dave Sabben was the Platoon Commander of 12Pl, D Coy, 6RAR in 1966.

And on the 18<sup>th</sup> August 1966 was the battle of Long Tan.

#### Long Tan?

Briefly, in the Battle of Long Tan, D445 NVA Battalion and 275<sup>th</sup> Viet Cong Regiment (total of about 1500 to 2500 strong) clashed with D Coy, 6RAR (108 strong) in a rubber plantation near the village of Long Tan. The result was a decided victory for the Australian forces, and a pivotal moment in the Australian war effort. It also was the single engagement in Viet Nam that killed the most Australians, 18, and recorded the greatest damage on enemy forces with 245 bodies remaining in the field after enemy withdrawal and an unknown number of dead buried along the withdrawal route. #### And the book Through Enemy Eyes.

The story is that battle from the viewpoint of the NVA commanding officers. (Ironically written by a platoon commanding officer in D Coy).

The style is called a 'factional' account of what happened. Facts of the event are strictly adhered to, but the detail which is lost with time and has been supplemented with imaginative characters and fictional detail. This literary technique has been done before with great success in *Gone With the Wind*, *The Cruel Sea* and other classics.

And has been done with great success here by creating fictional NVA commanding officers to bring to life what could be a dry academic tome and populate the story with personality and character.

What was such a large force doing attacking D Coy? Since the event information has been released that D Coy was not the target, and that the intended target was 1ATF (1<sup>st</sup> Australian Task Force, Nui Dat). And why did the operation, months in the planning, fail? Well, to tell you that would be a spoiler, wouldn't it?

Why did I like the book so much? I'm no dedicated fan of military history, and Viet Nam is not a part of my life that I continually want to revisit. But I still have many unanswered questions that pertain to that era of my life. This book was able to fill in some blanks in a manner that made sense, much more sense than the official variation of the events. It also gave reason to much of the activities that we undertook shortly after this event and gave me the opportunity to see our involvement from a different perspective.



The book was amazingly alive. The word pictures that Dave created in his story brought the work of planning, preparation and execution of this event into vivid detail, and the ambitions of those involved into realistic recreations.

As I said, the book had a profound effect on me, and I hope that someone else, either veteran, partner or child of veteran, or interested person can benefit as much as did from reading this book.

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## The 9th Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment:

The Battalion was formed on 13 November 1967 in South Australia. The Battalion served in South Vietnam from 5 November 1968 to 25 November 1969. The Battalion then remained at Enoggera until the 31 October, 1973 when it merged with 8 RAR to become the 8th/9th Battalion, The Royal Australian Regiment (8/9 RAR). The Battalion's service in South Vietnam resulted in the award of a Distinguished Service Order, two Military Crosses, seven Military Medals, and eleven members of the Battalion were Mentioned in Dispatches.

With the end of Vietnam War lists the OC A Coy Major W. McDonald had his MID (mentioned in Dispatches) upgraded to a Medal of Gallantry and 2nd Lt Geoffrey Locke was awarded an Commendation for Distinguished Service
