MEET AND GREET FRIDAY NATIONAL GALLERY OF VICTORIA

On a pleasant Melbourne evening reunion attendees walked past the famous Waterwall of the National Gallery of Victoria (NGV) to enter the building. After collecting our registration envelopes in the foyer, we moved into the Great Hall, with the world's largest stained-glass ceiling designed by Australian artist Leonard French. For those at the first national reunion in Melbourne in 1988 it brought back memories, for this is where the reunion dinner was held.



The day was auspicious, being the battalion's 48th birthday: 9 RAR was raised in Adelaide on 13 November 1967. But it was also Friday the 13th, and traffic in Melbourne on any Friday evening is congested. As our Patron, the Governor General, His Excellency General the Honourable Sir Peter Cosgrove, discovered. Returning from a visit to Ronald McDonald House in Monash, to the south of Melbourne. his entourage was still caught in traffic way past the Shrine of Remembrance when he was due to alight at the NGV. No matter, it allowed those attending to complete their registration and meet and greet



their friends in the Great Hall before our Patron arrived. In his brief visit General Cosgrove managed to meet and greet many of those present and participate in countless selfies and photographs.



He addressed the crowd and apologised for his truncated attendance at the reunion, but

Later in the evening Jenny Peachey spoke movingly to us. This being the first national reunion held since Margaret Morrison passed away last year, it was wonderful to have Alby and Margaret's daughter, and her husband John Peachey, with us at the NGV meet and greet. Jenny was with us again at the Shrine of Remembrance on Sunday.

This first function of the reunion differed somewhat from past reunions. In planning the event the reunion committee took careful note of comments from past reunions and chose not to have separate company functions or to divide the Great Hall of the NGV into company areas. Quality food and beverages were also a priority. And to be fair to those who drink little or not at all, you had to pay for alcoholic drinks after the first two, using a voucher (The same system was used at the BBQ on Sunday.) GUIDED TOUR OF THE GALLERIES OF REMEMBRANCE—SUNDAY

The Galleries of Remembrance is a new \$45 million redevelopment project that utilises 1,600 square metres of undercroft space that exists beneath the Shrine, funded by the Victorian Government and the Anzac Centenary Public Fund. Over 850 objects are included in permanent and temporary exhibition spaces which illustrate the experiences of Australians at war and in peacekeeping operations, from Pre-Federation to the present day, with a particular focus on individual and unit stories of Victorian service and sacrifice. Small items of family memorabilia to large scale audiovisuals and interactive technology provide a variety of moods and experiences.

The Guided Tour was an extremely popular Reunion option. Initially three guides from the Shrine volunteered to take the tours, which were outside normal Shrine opening hours, so we placed a limit of 120, thinking that would be plenty of spots. But they filled very quickly and some people were disappointed to miss out. Subsequently the Shrine advised us that guides would only be able to take 35 people each, so we had to disappoint another 15 people who had registered to bring the number down to 105.

The Tour Guides were very informative and were able to add lots of details to the already extensive audio visual commentaries throughout the galleries. You can even print your own service record for a small fee.

If you haven't visited the Galleries of Remembrance since its opening, make sure you do it next time you're in Melbourne. You can take a self guided tour, but I recommend joining one of the free guided tours, which are held twice daily.

MEMORIAL SERVICE SUNDAY

DAY TRIP TO SEYMOUR

This was one of the optional Monday activities and 44 people registered to take the trip. It was excellent value at \$35, which was mostly to cover the cost of the Crown Coach trip to Seymour and back. We assembled at the pickup point at Federation Square for a 10am departure. The coach was very comfortable and the driver, Dean, was an excellent host. We had to divert at Donnybrook to pick up Des and Ann Blazeley who were staying out that way.

The Commemorative Walk is right in the middle of Seymour. It depicts Australia's military commitment in



Vietnam, the period of our involvement and the aftermath.

The Walk is a meandering red earth path set in native trees and

that resemble rubber trees and rice paddies.

On arrival, we were met by representatives of the local RSL who outlined the history of the wall and showed us what to look for as we wandered along the walk. Obviously everyone found their own name and looked for the names of mates. It evoked great memories and discussions as we wandered along.

Along the length of this Walk are walls made up of panels of DigiGlass with the name of every Serviceman and Servicewoman who served in their various capacities. The names are separated only by the Service in which they served in alphabetical order. The plinths on which the panels stand have holes for Poppies. Behind the names is the picture story of the Vietnam conflict.

Following a very nice lunch at a local hotel we set out for nearby Puckapunyal. It was strange meeting a Wilson car park attendant at the gate, rather than an actual soldier, but I guess times have changed.

We were met by the curator of the museum on arrival who spoke to us about the museum and its extensive contents. The Army Tank Museum has more than 70 Armoured Fighting Vehicles on display in Hopkins Barracks, the home of Australian Armour at Puckapunyal. Covering an area of over 4000 square metres the museum is one of the largest armour museums in the Southern hemisphere.



We spent an hour or so examining all the sections of the museum. I didn't know there were so many different models of APCs. Just like cars!

If you're visiting the Commemorative Walk at Seymour, it's well worth a detour to the Army Tank Museum at Pucka

DAY TOUR TO PHILLIP IS-LAND



140 km south-southeast of Melbourne, Victoria. Named after Arthur Phillip, the first Governor of New South Wales, Phillip Island forms a natural breakwater for the shallow waters of the Western Port. It is 26 km long and 9 km wide, with an area of about 100 km². It has 97 km of coastline and is part of the Bass Coast Shire.

On Monday two busloads of reunion attendees headed off to Phillip Island for a long but engrossing day on Phillip Island, some 90 km southeast of Melbourne. Travelling through lush farmland at the western end of Gippsland, Victoria's prime dairy country, which was looking its best at the end of spring, we arrived at the National Vietnam Veterans Museum on time for an introduction to this unique independent museum founded and built by Vietnam veterans.

First we went out to the Garden of Remembrance behind the museum building, where a short commemoration service was held to dedicate a 9 RAR memorial plaque. In a moving gesture, our President Stan Sutherland called on someone from each company to read out the names of those from their company recorded on the 9 RAR honour roll. Then Stan opened officially the new 9 RAR interactive display inside the

museum. It certainly attracted a lot of attention, as did the rest of the museum's exhibits, including the Light & Sound show. Just as the museum's website says: "Unique. Authentic. Emotive." During this time we were treated to afternoon tea with wonderful scones and jam and cream, as you see only in the country.



We then repaired to the RSL Sub Branch Phillip Island for a drink or two and an early dinner. We were given a spacious function room for our large party. From the numbers of locals using the RSL (on a Monday), it's clearly a major social centre on Phillip Island and helps to promote the National Vietnam Veterans Museum.

We then headed off to see the world-famous Penguin Parade, managed by Phillip Island Nature Parks. Sitting on the foreshore at dusk, watching the waters of Bass Strait, darkness fell and scores of penguins started coming out of the water and making their way up the beach to their burrows in the dunes around, between and behind the viewing stands.



Low intensity floodlighting picks up the penguins' white fronts and they weren't hard to see. With plenty of large terns around, however, waiting to tackle any penguin falling behind on the march up the beach, it wasn't hard to see why the penguins moved together in tight military-like formations. Most of the penguins had come ashore within an hour, so we called it a day. The buses arrived back in Melbourne on schedule, after a long but varied and most interesting tour.

B Coy KIA 6 JANUARY 1969 OPERATION GOODWOOD

George is buried in his home country Ireland and has never had an official plaque from the Office of Australia War Graves (OAWG).

This is the email that started the ball rolling it is from Bill Williams ex 1 RAR to Mike von Berg President of the RAR Association National.

Hi Mike and Bob.

I am in Camolin Enniscorthy Wexford Ireland . I am staying with Ted Somers 1RAR Vietnam 1965/66 .

I have been here for 3 weeks and will return home on Saturday. We visited the grave of Pte George Nagle who was killed in Vietnam by a mine in 1969 whilst serving with 9 RAR. His mother had to pay 495 English pounds sterling to bring him home to Ireland to have him buried. As you can see there is no mention of Australia, 9 RAR, The Royal Australian Regiment or a Australian service plague on his grave. Members of the Regiment who now live in Ireland think that something should be done to honour George Nagle service to Australia and the Regiment.



George Nagle's niece has his medals and Georges brother Willie and other members of his extended family still live in Clonmel County Tipperary where George is buried. They have spoken with us and they are keen to have his service recognized. There must be something we can do to honour his service on his grave in the proper Australian way a Plaque the Regiment badge and his unit 9 RAR? Sunday was Irish Veterans Day same as ANZAC Day is for us .I have enclosed a photo of Ted with the slouch hat on a very big hit with the Irish .regards




We are making arrangements to have the plaque installed on the grave and will send you a photo when completed.

GENERAL INFORMATION

The Battalion banners are to be in position by 0900; as this is a very early start, therefore we do not

expect the usual delays which happen each year this time.

Most of you have done this march countless times; you know the drill, remember to remove your caps or hats when saluting the Eternal Flame and place your right hand over your medals.

Once we have passed the Eternal Flame and just before we reach the steps leading to the Shrine proper, we wheel to the 'right' heading down to the RAR tree/plaque and move in close together where battalion banner bearers are requested to display banners at the head of the gathering.

Catch a tram from the Domain Interchange to the corner of Commercial and St Kilda Roads—Trams to catch are 6, 67 or 72.

As we are starting the march early this year, we expect that it will be finished by 1030 hrs at the latest. This should get us to Rosco's before 1100 hrs.

I have spoken to Jason the owner and he has advised they open at 0800 hrs for breakfast, so an earlier start is not a problem.

1966 THE YEAR THAT CHANGED THE WORLD

To his mum Shaun was always a reserved personality but when he came back from a sevenmonth tour of Afghanistan Sue Jenkins

was shocked to find her boy even more withdrawn.

His family knew Private Shaun had been diagnosed with post traumatic stress disorder (PTSD) but he refused to talk about it.

When Shaun, still a serving member of the First Battalion, Royal Australian Regiment (1 RAR), came home for Christmas just past Mrs Jenkins said her son was "noticeably changed".

"He brushed it off saying he was just tired and chilling out - but he wasn't the same person and I had no idea what was coming," Mrs Jenkins told the Daily Telegraph in an exclusive interview.

The young soldier's family believe he was deeply affected by at least two incidents in Afghanistan, he took personally a Bushmaster armoured vehicle accident which crashed 50m down a cliff where the road had fallen away, injuring some of the nine personnel it was carrying.

Within weeks of the Christmas lunch, on January 31, Shaun took his own life. He was just 24.

Shaun Jenkins, based at Lavarack Barracks in Townsville, served in the Australian Defence Force from May 2010 until January 31, 2016.

Shaun is one of 240 Australian soldiers lost to suicide at home since 1999. Reportedly there have been 17 just this year to 31 March. John Davey
